# Spouse Fund dollars dispersed....

The CCIS Spouse Education Fund was created to help spouses who have interrupted their own education or career development in order to accompany international students coming to Stanford. Now in its 19th year, the Fund has awarded 177 grants to women and men from more than 30 countries to enable them to pursue their career and educational goals. We are grateful to our donors who make these grants possible.



This year, in spite of a drop in funding level, we have awarded grants to all 19 of the 19 applicants; however, in most cases we were unable to fund the full amount requested.

The grantees and their fields of study are:

Yeliz Celiker (Turkey) to take classes to prepare for the birth of her first child; Yuri Chang (Korea) to attend an art class in the Stanford Continuing Studies program;

**Yanhua Chang** (China) to begin studies at DeAnza College in preparation for a change of her major area of interest;

**Melanie Chong** (Singapore) toward completion of course in stock photography and/or grant writing;

**Naja de Pilla** (Australia) for books and supplies to assist her preparation for taking the U.S. Medical License Examination so that she may continue her medical career;

**Mao Ching Foo** (Singapore) to help fund studies at UC Berkeley toward a Master's Degree in Financial Engineering;

**Ingrid Hornickel Velasquez** (Venezuela) to continue studies at UC Berkeley in the Certificate Program in Project Planning and Controlling;

Yi Jiang (China) to continue classes at the Academy of Art University;

**Kyung A Kim** (Korea) for study in the Department of Structural Biology at UC Berkeley contingent on her acceptance by Berkeley;

**Silvia Eunyong Kim** (Korea) for music lessons at the Community School of Music and Art contingent upon her acceptance by the school;

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#### Where Oh Where are the Volunteers?

The new year brings more new students, scholars, and post-doctorates who want to practice speaking English with someone willing to listen, correct without criticism, and give them confidence speaking English. So many internationals, not enough volunteers. Our current volunteers are terrific and often take more than one international as an EIA partner. We have matched 160 internationals with partners since September but more register every week.

We can't keep pace with serving the needs of internationals who register for English-in-Action (EIA), thus new volunteers are needed. The commitment is minimal, just one hour per week with an international who requests conversational assistance with pronunciation. If you, your spouse, or your friend could visit with an EIA partner an hour a week, please let us know. Just contact us; we will make the initial arrangements.

In theory, EIA is a one-year commitment. The reality is, friendships develop and often continue as long as the international is at Stanford and beyond. We have matched 160 internationals with partners since September but more register every week. Contact:

# The President's Column . . .



The concept of membership can create confusion among some new EIA volunteers who see CCIS as a matching service. They may not realize that they are welcome volunteers in a respected organization with a fifty year history of service. Thus the surprise when the Membership Registration Form arrives during the summer and CCIS asks them to update our database, choose the programs they would like to work with in the coming year, and make a contribution.

CCIS is strange about dues. Our Constitution specifically says that anyone is welcome to participate without becoming a dues-paying member. And then, just in case someone misses it, it says, "Payment of membership dues and/ or volunteer service in CCIS programs entitles one to receive the CCIS newsletter, to vote in the annual election of officers and to participate in its programs." I doubt that there are any other organizations on campus that do not require a specific financial commitment in order to participate. From the beginning CCIS believed in sweat equity.

The funny thing about the money is how little is required for such a large service. The budget for the current year is \$7250, but we have no paid staff, the I-Center provides the office, use of the building's facilities, and supplies a limited number of parking permits. Our biggest expenses are for the Communiqué and mailing (\$1575), Membership communications (\$1000), the computer and internet connection (\$750), General Office expenses (\$700), English in Action (\$500), English Classes (\$400), Community Advisors (\$400), and Potlucks (\$300). Other student program services such as Hospitality, Professional Liaison, and Homestay function on \$50 to \$125 each. This year we have donated \$1000 to the I-Center for photocopy expenses. We also budget \$500 for attendance at national and regional meetings. Each year through the contributions of our members we manage to make our budget.

The Spouse Fund generates its own income and each year awards grants totaling around \$6800 from it's endowment fund and from current giving. Current giving has been down a bit in the last year or so.

The Board, which consists of the four elected officers and the seventeen program chairs, meets eight times a year to approve the budget and appointments, plan activities, review policy, and ratify Constitutional amendments and bylaws. We work cooperatively with the I-Center but are independent. Again, from our Constitution, "The Board of Directors alone shall have the authority to commit the CCIS to any activity or financial obligation." The officers are elected at the annual meeting in April by the membership and active volunteers.

Thus, CCIS as an organization doesn't match the model of the campus organizations that are solely dependent on Stanford staff. As a campus volunteer organization, the CCIS is atypical.

I realize that this description sounds like a reading designed to put you to sleep, but it is in these details that the organization remains open and democratic. CCIS needs not only members to teach the classes, meet with their partners, host individuals and families; it also needs leaders who are willing to organize these programs. If you are interested in taking a managing role, you are more than welcome. You will meet some very interesting people and have a good time. 




Josephine and Mark attended and supported our CCIS Holiday Open House on Dec. 3. Did you meet them there?
